

- The Alaska Highway (ALCAN) is a 1,390-mile road stretching from Dawson Creek, BC, Canada, to Delta Junction, Alaska.
- The road was originally built mostly by the US Army as a supply route during World War II.
- During the summer, gas, food, and lodging are available about every 20 to 50 miles.
- During the winter, services are VERY limited, so always be prepared!





Alaska has very few roads. Did you know that over ninety percent of Alaska can only be reached by plane? Alaska is the only state where you cannot drive to its capital city.

To reach Juneau you must take a commercial flight, cruise ship, or ferry.

To experience Alaska's distinct cultures, land types, and animals you must fly. Many Alaskans have private licenses and pilot Piper cubs, Cessnas, Beavers, and Otters. Towns often have small charter airlines. Book flights to reach remote villages and camping places. Bush planes often have tires over two feet high, enabling them to land on the treeless tundra and in places with no airstrip.




- Powerful bald eagles can fly up to 10,000 feet in the air, soar on rising air currents, and dive at speeds close to 100 mph.

- 7. The bear's den.



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

Sourdough says:

In the Alaskan Interior, this bear is called a grizzly. On the coast, folks name it brown bear. Adult bears weigh from five hundred to fifteen hundred pounds and can be nine feet high when standing tall. At birth, cubs weigh as much as a large potato.

Biologist tips for hiking in bear country include making noise as you hike. Talk or sing. Wear bear bells. Don't wear earbuds. If you meet a bear, stand still. Raise your arms to help the bear know you are a human. Avoid looking at the bear directly in its eyes. Talk to the bear as you slowly back up. Do not panic, shout, or run as the bear may think you are prey. Carry bear spray.



The answer is Whistle!





Slide your fingers into the 4 open corners on the back. Now you can open and close in two directions.
